History Detectives, 4th - 8th grade

The History Detectives investigate four stories from the American West. Did a biography of legendary frontiersman Kit Carson once belong to members of his family? Then, from the rodeo to Hollywood, Yakima Canutt made life safer for movie stunt artists. What is the meaning behind the mysterious inscription on sheet music of the popular western song "Tumbling Tumbleweeds"? Finally, did a pivotal character in the Modoc Indian wars weave this basket?

After watching this episode, choose from the following questions and/or tasks to extend your learning

Question Box 1

- Who was Kit Carson?
- What type of lifestyle did a frontiersman live?
- How did Carson gain fame in the 1840s?
- Why does Wes Cowan believe this book, Kit Carson's Biography, was written in the 1850s or 1860s?
- Kit Carson couldn't read or write so if Kit Carson didn't record the geneology; who did?
- Carson was apparently a very private person, so why did he dictate his biography?
- What is meant by "not every story is as it entirely happened"?
- After Kit Carson's death, how did he become more famous?
- Where did Terry Garber find this saddle and what attracted it to him?
- The name on the cantle is Yak Canutt, who is he?
- What brand is found on the saddle?
- What is the expected age of the saddle? Why do the experts infer that the saddle has been "ridden hard"?
- What do the numbers and the word "special" stamped into the saddle mean?
- List the western movies mentioned in this episode that Yak Canutt was in.
- How does Wes Cown use these call movies to verify the authenticity of the saddle and its owner?
- Even though Yak was in Hollywood movies, he is better known for what?
- What does he discover about the saddle owned by Terry Garber?
- Why do they surmise that this saddle was not in the movies? Describe the features that tell what this saddle was used for.







- Why does this saddle have Yak's name on it if it was used by Yak?
- Tumbling Tumbleweeds
- Who wrote Tumbling Tumbleweeds and when?
- Who recorded Tumbling Tumbleweeds and when? What were their names?
- What was the original name of the song?
- What is the meaning or message in the song?
- Bob Nolan wrote, "This was the second song I wrote in 1932. It has been both bad and good to me." What do you think he meant by both bad and good to me? Provide detailed specifics.
- What tales does this Modoc basket tell of the heroism of an American-Indian woman?
- Who is Toby Riddle?
- How does expert Natalie Linn know that this basket is definitely Modoc?
- How old does she think the basket is and how can she tell?
- What is a maker's mark?
- Describe what materials are used to make a basket and how a basket is made?
- Describe the battle that made Toby Riddle famous.
- What does Toby Riddle do after the battle and why?
- Toby Riddle's Modoc name was Nanooktow which meant Strange Child, tell three things about Toby Riddle that indicates that she was an unconventional person.

Question Box 2

- What do you think it was like to live in a place and time where things were yet undiscovered and relationships with others were not yet developed? How would you feel? What would be your priorities? How would you survive and thrive?
- What are some of the luxuries of the 21st century that you would miss the most?
- What would you enjoy about life during the late 19th century and early 20th century?

Question Box 3 (Tasks)

- What was it like in the American Frontier? Research life in the American West from 1850-1925. Include geography, history, folklore and cultural expression.
- Create a timeline of the American Old West to span approximately a hundred years. From your timeline, describe the change over time,
- How does the settling of the west differ when viewed from others' perspectives (Native Americans and the settlers/cowboys/explorers)?
- What are the ethics, structures and rules that governed this region during this period of time?
- Write a list of unanswered questions.


Question Box 4 (Enrichment)

Question Box 5 (Extend/Real-Life)

- Watch two-three western movies, compare and contrast the real-life of those that live in the American Frontier to the way life was portrayed in Hollywood movies.*Videos can be found on youtube. Movies can be accessed via NextFlix or Hulu.
 - As you watch this episode write down the jobs that you see people working in.
 (As many as possible)
 - Next to each of the jobs you listed write yes if the job still exists, write no if the job does not exist.
 - For each one that you said "yes", list the similarities and differences between how the job was done then and how it is done now.
 - For each one that you said "no", it does not exist, try to think of a job that exists today that would serve a similar purpose. For example, a blacksmith is someone who puts horseshoes on. That job could be the equivalent of an auto mechanic today because they keep the transportation working.
- List one or two jobs that exist today that you think may not exist in 5 or 10 years. (If you get stuck ask a family member for ideas) Explain why you think they won't exist.
