History Detectives - 4th - 8th

HISTORY DETECTIVES tells four stories of our nation's beginning. First, Eduardo Pagan starts with a simple bill of sale for a 17-year old "negro girl" and learns how young Willoby's life unfolds from being property to owning property. Then Gwen Wright traces a powder horn from a muddy Minnesota field to a military captain in Massachusetts during the American Revolution. Elyse Luray asks what role a handwritten score played in making "The Star Spangled Banner" our national anthem. Finally, notes in a 1775 almanac show how conflicting loyalties strained family ties during the Revolution.

After watching this episode, choose from the following questions and/or tasks to extend your learning

Question Box 1

- What happens in 1808 with regards to the slave trade? What happened as a result?
- How are slaves listed in the census prior to emancipation? After emancipation?
- What impressed you the most about Willoby's life? Provide evidence from the episode.
- What roles did Powder horns play in US History?
- What happened if you spoke out against the Suffolk resolves or spoke highly of England in Suffolk County?

Question Box 2

- What was your favorite part of this program and why?
- The Taylor family was divided over the American Revolution. What's something that has divided you from someone you care about? How has that been resolved?
- What do you think you learned from this program?
- What was most challenging about this episode?
- Explain determination and perseverance and why it is important to have these traits as they relate to this episode.

Box 3 (Tasks)

Explain the Suffolk Resolves and how that pushed the colonies towards war.

- Compare the original score of The Star Spangled Banner with the Damrosh and Sousa version. What musical changes were made? How did these changes effect the performance of the song?
